Peabodians Unveil Historical Marker

A public dedication and unveiling ceremony for the Peabody High School Historical Highway Marker, honoring "the earliest publicly funded high school for African Americans in Virginia" was held on Saturday, May 26,

2012. PEABODY HIGH SCHOOL (1870-1970) Peabody High School, originally the Colorest High School, was established in 1870 in the old First Baptist Church located on Harrison Street. The second school was built on Fillmore Street. The current site of the school is on Wesley Street. Peabody is one of the partiest publicly funded high schools for African Americans in Virginia. The city of Petersburg had began to develop a public school system as early as 1868 and provided the funding needed to build rity schools and pay teacher salaries. Alfred Payor became the school's first African American principal in 1682.


The unveiling took place on the corner of Harrison and Liberty Streets, only a few feet from the site of the Old African Church. which housed the first Peabody School in 1870. A large crowd filled the blocked-off section of Harrison Street to witness and help celebrate the significance and the honor of the school receiving a state historical marker, and the milestone accomplishment of the Peabody High School National Alumni Association.

The ceremony started on schedule with the Vice-President, R.J. Bragg (class of '59), serving as mistress of ceremonies. Elder James "Ray" Clarke (class of '64) blessed the occasion. Available to give greetings and congratulatory remarks were The Honorable Brian Moore (Petersburg's Mayor), Councilman Howard Myers, Councilwoman Treska Wilson-Smith, and City Manager, William Johnson. Delegate Rosalyn Dance (class of

'66) was not able to attend, but she sent a letter of congratulations which was read to those assembled. Also available was Peter Luebke, Highway Marker Historian with the Virginia Department of Historic Resources, who explained briefly the process by which highway markers are obtained.

To set the tone and remind persons of the rich heritage of Peabody High School and "why rejoicing the love and legacy should be something they should be doing today, tomorrow and many days to come" was Thelma Jefferson, President of PHSNAA (class of '67). Music for the occasion was provided by the Peabody Middle School Band, directed by Janice Mann (class of '70). A beautiful rendition of "My Tribute" was sung by the Rev. Vernon "Billy" Lee (class of '57). Before the benediction by Rev. Jeremiah Tillman, Pastor of First Baptist Church (Harrison Street), the crowd sang the Peabody Alma Mater. According to President Jefferson. "A lot of hard work went into deciding on the correct verbiage for the marker and receiving the proper approval. Requesting the highway marker did not start with my administration; it was 'a work in progress' prior to me taking over the presidency. However, through my persistence and the dedication and continuous hard work of the current administration, we were able to make the unveiling of the marker a reality." On hand to assist President Jefferson with unveiling the marker was Ms. Patricia Crocker, a faculty member from Peabody Middle School.

Juanita Owens Wyatt was born in Petersburg, VA to Joseph and Gladys Wyatt Owens. Her first educational experience began on the campus of the then Virginia State College's (now University) Kindergarten. After graduating from Peabody High School in 1956, she matriculated at Bennett College, in Greensboro, NC. In 1960, she graduated with a degree in K-12 education and a minor in political science. Her post-graduate disciplines consisted of Industrial Psychology, Urban Planning, Curriculum Design, United States History, United States Economic History, World History, Ancient Civilization, World Economics, Campaign Management, Powers of Political Persuasion, the Continent of Africa, and Civics. These disciplines were held at various universities such as Virginia State

University, University of Virginia, Virginia Commonwealth University, Bowie State University, Kent State University in Ohio, DC University (DC Teachers College), and the University of Richmond.

Her career has been as diverse as the schools she attended. She taught in the District of Columbia School System for nine years; she worked in the Department of Interior composing letters for the Director of Land Management and EEO Director for two years. During the summers, she trained in the Peace Corps on how to teach science in Sierra Leone, West Africa. She was Director of the YWCA-PINS Residential Project (Persons in Need of Supervision); Teacher in the Alexandria Public School System for two years, Member of the Virginia Water Project for two years, and Teacher in the Petersburg Public School System for 21 years.

Following in the footsteps of her father, Joseph Owens, who became the first Black City Councilman in Petersburg, Juanita was affiliated with many political and civic involvements: (1958) Met Martin Luther King, Jr. at Bennett College, which changed her view of self and the world; (1963) Charter member of Young Democrats of Washington, DC; (1970) Co-Director of the Urban League National Leadership Conference; (1985-89) First woman Chairperson of Petersburg's Democratic Committee; (2007) Vice Chair of the Petersburg Redevelopment and Housing Authority. Juanita is the widow of Steven Randolph Wyatt and the eldest of three siblings: Cornelia Owens Goode and Joseph H. Owens, Jr.




In Loving Memory Of Janice Stith Jones


